## Dear Fríends

Over the past weekend, as I wrote this letter, there have been reports in some media of the state of the Church in the United Kingdom and of the Church of England in particular. It is no secret that there has been an ongoing decline and ageing of church membership for some years now. This, of course, is concerning for those at Diocesan level, and no less for those of us in the parishes, which are the heart of church life. The statistics produced by the British Social Attitudes Survey and the European Social Survey suggest that, in the United Kingdom, nearly 50% of people have no religion at all. Anglicans make up only 17.2% of the remaining 50+%.

A pressing problem is the ever-reducing numbers of stipendiary clergy. However, in spite of there now being large numbers of self-supporting and Lay ministers, for many church congregations church life today can seem a never-ending round of fundraising, coupled with the ever present problem of finding someone to conduct services.

This situation is one of the reasons why in Cumbria, and indeed other parts of the country, new strategies and approaches to ministry are being initiated. For Cumbria, this involves the formation of Mission Communities, with an emphasis

on Lay ministry and significantly increased cooperation with the Methodist and United Reform Churches and other denominations.

In Chapter 24 of St. Luke's Gospel the story is told of how Jesus accompanied two of his disciples on the road to Emmaus. They did not recognise him until he accepted their offer of hospitality and broke bread with them, when they said to each other '*Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the scriptures to us*'. From this event, they and the other disciples, declaring that the Lord has risen, then go out to the ends of the earth and share the Good News.

I mention all of this because when this Newsletter appears at the beginning of June, it will coincide with the Feast of Pentecost. Pentecost is one of the great festivals in the church because the events of that day are seen as the birth of the church.

At His ascension, 40 days after His resurrection, Jesus had promised his Apostles that the Holy Spirit would come and empower them to go out and preach the good news of the love of God to all the world. We accept that this promise is for all of those who believe, and so the celebration of the festival of Pentecost acts as a reminder, and encourages us not to lose heart or faith, either as individuals or as the body of the church.

It was the beginning of the church in which as members we too can be bold and strong and know that God is with us as we face the challenges before us.

So you who come often, and you who have not been to church for a long time, do come and join us for Pentecost on June  $4^{th}$ , and celebrate the Risen Lord.

#### Lent Lunches

During the five weeks of Lent, some 75 people attended the ever-popular Lent Lunches, even braving the inclement weather on one snowy Wednesday. Tasty homemade soups, bread and bread rolls, coffee and biscuits, provided by PCC members, supplied refreshment for these most sociable gatherings. As in previous years, these lunches were free of charge, but an impressive figure of £338 overall was donated which, with tax relief, has enabled us to send £422 to The Red Cross in support of their admirable work.

#### Thy Kingdom Come

Be Part of a Global Christian Movement. Between 25<sup>th</sup> May and 11<sup>th</sup> June communities and churches around the world are gathering together to pray that their friends, families and neighbours come to know Jesus Christ.

At its simplest, our prayer is "Thy Kingdom Come" – a prayer that God will establish his kingdom of justice and peace "on earth as it is in heaven" – in our families, in our communities, in our nations and in the whole earth. That kingdom is one that is established through individual souls coming to know Jesus for themselves, accept his love and forgiveness in their lives and begin to live in joyful obedience to his teachings and commands.

Prayer events of all shapes and sizes will take place across the period, including 24-7 prayer rooms, prayer days, prayer walks and half nights of prayer. Cathedrals, churches and other venues will host Beacon Events, gathering people across towns and cities to worship and to pray for the empowering of the Holy Spirit for effective witness.

During this event Bampton will be hosting Morning Prayer at 9.30am on **Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> June**. Anybody who is interested in attending any of the events can obtain the dates and venues from the Churchwardens – details will also appear on the church notice board.

Services will start at **9.30am** and the first one at Bampton will be on **Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> June**. They will be happy to see anyone who is able to join them. #### Church Bells – 'Ding Dong Merrily On High' Still On Track!

Another milestone was reached in our appeal when the Parochial Church Council wrote to the bell founders and converted the provisional booking made earlier in the year into a firm order. This may have been the trigger that has enabled the bell founders to write and say that "all being well" the installation will start in late November and that they "hope to have the bells ringing for Christmas." No longer is it "IF" but "WHEN"!!

None of this would have been possible without the amazing support we have had from within the parish and from well-wishers further afield.

There are still opportunities for individuals, couples or families to commemorate their association with those communities within the parish after which five of the new bells have been named – Bampton, Bomby, Burnbanks, Butterwick and Knipe. For a more modest amount than that of sponsoring a bell, certain parts of the associated bell fittings can have names inscribed on them.

#### **Educational Grants: The Bampton Endowed Schools Endowment**

Last year the Charity made 9 grants totalling  $\pounds 2,475$  to local young people. These awards were mainly to help them financially while they took part in a variety of post-secondary school courses at college or university.

The Trustees now invite applications for financial support from those who will be undertaking courses at any University, college or institution of higher or further education in autumn 2017. Consideration will also be given to applications from those who will be taking part in other forms of post-secondary education (including the study of music or other arts) to prepare for entry into any occupation, trade or profession.

To be eligible the applicant must be:

- Under the age of 25 on 1<sup>st</sup> September 2017
- Resident in the civil parish of Bampton, Cumbria or to have attended Bampton Endowed School.

CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal

pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory We will not normally be tasked to any incident arrest, some trauma. involving children under 12.
