## Dear Friends

At the time of writing this column the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Votes for Women has recently passed. The right of women to vote in 1918 at the end of the First World War was limited and took another ten years for the franchise to be widened. It was a great victory, and with a sense of understatement recognised the contribution and achievement of women during the struggle in the Great War. It wasn't of course just about that. It was more importantly about the fundamental right of women to exist and accrue the benefits that were given and enjoyed by men in a patriarchal society that often treated women as second-class citizens. Even today the place of women in the UK and internationally still has a long way to go. Equal pay, responsibility at higher levels of business and government and other sections of society are woefully short for women in general. Society, including the Church, with women occupying all level of responsibility, is waking up to these injustices and hopefully the situation is changing and will continue to change. We shall see.

The reason I mention all of this as we celebrate Easter and having celebrated Christmas not that long ago is that Christians believe God had something to say about equality among other things and did something about it by allowing his Son Jesus Christ to live on earth. There were various reasons for this. Among them, as we read in the Gospel of Luke 1: 46-55 in Mary's song (known as the Magnificat), are the purposes of God and which Jesus would express in his own teaching when quoting from Isaiah 61 in Luke 4: 16ff and later in what we call the Beatitudes in the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5-7. The fundamental principle enshrined in that teaching was the love of God for all and the equality of all humanity irrespective of race, colour or creed etc, themes picked up by the apostle Paul in his letter to the Galatians 3: 28.

For these reasons Christmas and Easter are inextricably linked together in that God demonstrates his care and compassion for his creation and desire to be at one with it, and the means by which we can all enjoy a relationship with him. At the same time this encourages us through the teaching and example of Jesus to live lives with a purpose and meaning and for the benefit of others.

Easter Day celebrates the rising of the Son of God from the tomb and victory over death and hope for the future – serious, yet wonderful and ultimately joyous. Jesus life and death and resurrection has given us the vote for equality and over death.

May this Easter be for you a time for family, friends, maybe a service at one of our churches and even some Easter eggs to enjoy.

## **Bampton and District Local History Society**

Severe weather forced us to postpone another meeting at the beginning of February but a brief lull enabled us to go ahead at a later date. On Tuesday February 20<sup>th</sup>, more than 20 members and several visitors enjoyed a fascinating evening exploring new ways of identifying archaeological features that might otherwise not be revealed. Our speaker Joe Ridley demonstrated how he has been collaborating with local historians to exploit the new technique – LIDAR – which uses laser light to detect variable distances to the ground. devised his own computer package to interpret the aerial images provided by LIDAR and he showed a number of archaeological sites in Bampton, Knipe, Helton and Setterah Park. These revealed several examples of medieval field systems, access roads and settlements and opened up rich possibilities for anyone willing to do further work with the data. Joe has very generously offered to supply his software and technical support to enable a LIDAR analysis of the Parish of Bampton to be carried out. Bampton Local History NEEDS YOU!

More traditional but equally inspiring was the meeting which followed after LIDAR – this was the session on 'Dry Stone Walls and Landscape History' given by Professor Angus Winchester. Angus described the form, function and types of stone walls in upland Britain and showed that although some are medieval in origin, many are only a couple of hundred years old. Medieval farm systems with their large open fields had less need of walls than the smaller, individual enclosed fields of the 'agricultural revolution'. Intakes from the unenclosed fell also demanded walls – low if cattle were being contained but higher to contain the more agile sheep. 'Reading' the walled landscape took on a new fascination and copies of Angus latest book 'Dry Stone Walls History and Landscape' were an instant sellout.

CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest, some trauma. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12.

Councillors discussed many matters at the recent meeting of the Council, from the extension of the Millennium Footpath, on which work has now begun, to planning applications and road difficulties caused by the recent bad weather.

The Clerk had attended a workshop on the new Data Protection regulations which are to come in to force at the end of May and she reported on what she had learnt, which was that it was extremely complicated and would have implications for the council. A Data Protection Officer would need to be appointed and other measures put into place. Advice on the implementation of these regulations would be sought.

The Annual Parish Meeting this year will be held on **Tuesday May 22^{nd}** and as well as being an opportunity for your concerns to be aired there will be films on some elements of the Lake District National Park's Local Plan review – a chance to find out what is planned for the park in the future. An officer from the Park may be present to answer questions but that has not yet been finalised. Posters nearer the time will make things clear or come in person to see what is going on! There will be refreshments and socialising after the talk. Councillors hope to see you there.

Cumbria Police and partners are taking another step forward in the bid to tackle sheep theft. Officers, along with Amanda Wallbank from the NFU, have handed over new product 'TecTracer' to farmers at a meeting in Appleby on February 8th. 40 farmers will receive a pot of the sheep marking product, thanks to funding from the county's Police and Crime Commissioner. Consisting of a sheep marking paint that contains thousands of numerically coded microdots, TecTracer aims to help prevent sheep theft as well as assist in identifying the owner of any sheep suspected of being stolen.
