
## BAMPTON PARISH NEWSLETTER OCTOBER - NOVEMBER 2019



## Dear Friends

The prospect of being 'saved' through faith will mean different things to different people. St Paul's falling groundward from his horse as Jesus speaks to him directly 'from the ether' is perhaps *the* striking example while countless others have had less physically painful though not necessarily less life-changing experiences! What might we expect from such 'imminent' encounters? The future St Augustine was sitting under a tree with a book when God spoke 'in the manner of a child'. William Blake, poet and artist, once received divine creative inspiration whilst sunbathing whereas Joan of Arc was simply walking in the countryside when, according to the popular account, St Michael appeared to her telling her to take courage and speak up for her nation of France. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, was at a simple prayer meeting in a cold basement he'd tried strenuously to avoid when he found his heart 'strangely warmed' by God's Holy Spirit.

In the Bible both younger and older men and women are not infrequently called into God's service – and thereafter salvation – through the interventions and mediation of others. Esther was advised by her uncle, Mordecai, through a friend "Yet who knows whether you have come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" (Esther 4.14)

Isaiah the great Old Testament prophet was visiting the temple when God summoned him to action. Amos, another prophet, perceived heaven's judgement to be adverse with regard to the society around him (with an expectation that he might himself begin to put that right) whilst King David's psalms record an astute awareness of God's great love and forgiveness for all those who seek such things as well as his own personal (though divinely-inspired) indignation against those who dismiss them.

In the New Testament many individuals take up Jesus' call to simply 'follow' him. Beyond the twelve apostles (and St Paul) he had thousands of other faithful disciples.

But there were also those who let Jesus down, including Peter, 'the rock', who bitterly regretted his earlier errors and had a prime role in developing Christianity. In the Old Testament a ruler, Saul, turned from God despite the latter's favouring him to be king whilst Jonah, when summoned to preach in a great city, Nineveh, took a leisure trip to Tarshish instead. Some of us who are lay preachers also have times when we'd sometimes like to change our slots on the rota! We all – lay or ordained – have to try to hear God's call wherever he asks us to be, though, and whatever tasks he has for us.

I think of some of the people I've known myself. In Askham D-, a Roman catholic, first decided to try attending church too whilst on a teenage cinema visit with a friend; not a typical approach! Paul, a young priest, was an earnest socialist when he turned towards Christianity – and in some ways still is! Philip, also a cleric, practised as a lawyer in an office overlooking St Paul's cathedral, London, where daily visible evidence of the place the divine has in our world, proved for him too much of an attraction.

We all have something to offer others; there's a little groove or niche in God's universe for each of us. This is true even if we're not part of the Christian church. Everyone has talent! However, God can use any skills we do possess most profitably of all.

Your hotline to your local councillor may temporarily be down — especially after 10 pm or on a Sunday evening! But hotlines to Jesus as the One divinely elected by God and provider of salvation for all time, do not collapse even if that line occasionally seems fragile.

This is called praying – we should all try to do it as often as we can and BT won't bill us for doing so!

# Bampton does its bit for global warming – Photovoltaic (PV) panels on the Memorial Hall roof: a 10 year report

The PV panels on the Memorial Hall roof have now been operating for 10 years – they were commissioned on 24<sup>th</sup> July 2009. Up to the end of July 2019 they had generated 39,970kWh of electricity. To put this in context one kilowatt hour (kWh) is the electricity used for running a one kilowatt electric fire for one hour. Our generation is thus equivalent to running such a fire nonstop for just over four and a half years.

This total electricity output is estimated to have saved 17,187kg (about 17 tons) of carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) that would otherwise have been emitted by burning coal, oil or gas to produce the same amount of electricity. To again put this in context, the average CO<sub>2</sub> emissions from new cars registered in 2017 was 121g/km. On this basis such a car would emit 17,187kg of CO<sub>2</sub> in making about 440 round trips between Bampton and Manchester (one round trip about every 8 days for 10 years).

Over the 10 year period the average output per day has been 10.88kWh but as you would expect this varies greatly between summer and winter with typically about 1 or 2kWh generated per day in December and January and just over 20kWh per day in June and July. The maximum generation in a month was produced in May 2018 with a daily average of 25.76kWh followed by June 2010 (22.95kWh) and June 2018 (22.55kWh).

The control system for the panels is arranged so that the electricity generated is used within the Hall if there is a demand for electricity there. On average over the 10 year period the Hall only uses 19% of the electricity produced, the remaining 81% is fed back into the electricity grid. Again this percentage varies greatly over the year with about 50% of the production being used in the Hall during the winter months but only about 10% used in the summer.

The Hall is paid for the generated electricity through the so-called Feed-in Tariff (FIT) in two ways – for the total amount generated and, in addition, a smaller amount for that which is exported to the grid. The current rates are 47.25p/kWh for that generated and in addition 3.82p/kWh for all the export. Because the system was installed very early in the government's incentive scheme to install renewable energy systems, these rates we obtain for generated electricity are very generous. For comparison a typical rate for the supply of electricity for domestic use might be in the range 10 to 20p/kWh. The total income that we have received over the 10 year period is just under £18,000. In addition, since we have used 19% of the generated electricity, we have not had to pay for this through our regular electricity bills and this is equivalent to a saving of about £750 over the 10 years.

The initial capital cost of the PV system was £30,144. At the same time we also installed improved insulation to the outside walls of the large hall and redecorated, this costing £11,523. Towards the total overall cost of £41,667 we obtained grants of £35,892 with the balance of £5,775 being funded locally, £3,000 from the Bampton Trust, £2,275 from Hall funds and £500 from the Parish Council.

Over the last 10 years the PV system has been mostly trouble-free. One of the inverters (which are installed in the wooden cupboards at the back of the stage and convert the DC produced by the panels to AC to use and feed into the grid) failed in 2010 and was replaced under guarantee. Earlier this year one of the inverters also failed and was replaced at a cost of £1,033.

The efficiency of new PV panels has increased greatly over the last 10 years and the price has also come down significantly. New systems are therefore much cheaper than they were. But the income received for generated electricity is also very much less than the rates we are receiving. All in all though the PV panels have proved a good investment for the Hall and the village and we will continue to receive significant income until the current scheme finishes in 15 years time.

CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest, some trauma. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12.

#### **Bampton Parish Council**

Two New councillors have now joined the council which now has its full complement again. Rich Shave and Pete Salway were welcomed. Also new was Mrs Laura Harker from Askham the recently elected EDC councillor who introduced EDC's consultation on the 'New Vision of the Future of Eden'. There is an exhibition at Rheged and an open consultation event there on October 1<sup>st</sup>. Further information is obtainable from the Town Hall, Penrith or online.

There was considerable discussion about the treatment of verges and grassy areas in the village which are currently strimmed on contract three times a year. It was felt that this was insufficient in places where visibility for drivers was important and too frequent for the viability of wildlife. It was decided that in future the road side verges should be cut more often to a depth of a metre from the road and some areas would be sown with wild flowers and left uncut for longer until seed had been set. The current contractor is happy to follow the new specifications and Mr Schofield, RSPB, has offered to help with wild flower planting in the spring. Also on a 'green' theme the maintenance of the willow tunnel in the playground was discussed. It cannot have escaped notice that the willow has shot up at an incredible rate and now almost resembles a jungle! Luckily a volunteer has come forward and offered to attempt to bring it under control and he is thanked for that. The bees or wasps that were troublesome there a little while ago seem to have gone but if you do encounter any please let me or any councillor know.

The lack of green waste wheelie bins for individual households was once again brought up and Mrs Harker was not able to give any hope that EDC might offer them to parishes currently not supplied although the tender was up for review. Would you please let the parish council know your thoughts on this issue and also what you think about the current provision of the green skip – is it adequate in size and should it come more frequently for instance. Cumbria County Council is currently offering compost bins at heavily discounted prices and you can find out more about them on the CCC website.

Following on from the meeting with Lowther Estate's Mr Bliss regarding Setterah Park and the plans for the rewilding of the River Lowther there, the PC sent a lengthy response to the planning application for the first phase of the work taking into account opinions and concerns expressed at the meeting and since by local farmers.

The next council meeting will be on Tuesday, November 19<sup>th</sup> at 7.30pm and all are welcome to attend.

'Strong General Wanted' – Mrs Dafforn, Dun Bull, Mardale [a General was a general servant, usually a teenage girl].

Married at Shap Church, Benjamin 1<sup>st</sup> and eldest son of Mr & Mrs Pears, Scarside, to Eleanor (Nellie) 4<sup>th</sup> daughter of Mr & Mrs Christopher Barnett, Shap Lodge and Rosgill Head. The new vicar took it. Reception at Shap Lodge.

Died at High Knipe, 27<sup>th</sup> September, Gordon Hodgson, son of Timothy and Elizabeth Hodgson, aged 3 years.

Joke: Lady visiting a grumpy old man, "Isn't it good of the Vicar to send you all these?" Man, "Good? Why? It's what 'e's for, aint it?"
