Dear Friends

It would no doubt raise a few eyebrows among my friends, knowing my total lack of interest in the cooking *process* (as distinct from the *outcome*, of course!), to find me starting this piece with a reference to the Great British Bake Off. However, I recently read this comment which I found rang several bells in my mind.

"Bake Off's sustained appeal is no surprise. When much of our news is a combination of confusing, depressing, and downright vitriolic, the opportunity to spend an hour soaking in the warm innocence of the Bake Off tent is a welcome escape. Though billed as a 'baking competition' there's something unusual about the way the bakers 'compete'. What takes place in the tent is more a working alongside than a working against. When bakers have a spare minute, they help other contestants out. When they're unsure how to proceed, they ask one another. When they struggle or are sent home, the overwhelming reaction of the others isn't relief or smugness, but compassion."

Knowingly or not, the contestants are expressing something of their true nature as created beings. The Bible declares that God made us for relationship – to express our human creativity in partnership and mutual support rather than in competition and rivalry. At Christmas and throughout the year we celebrate a God who comes alongside us, to 'be there' for us in all the challenges life may throw at us. A God whose aim is not to put us down through constant criticism and judgement but to release the full potential which lies within us all as people made 'in his image'. A God who invites each of us to join with him in this enterprise in our everyday life and relationships.

In competitive workplaces and in a deeply divided society, Bake Off reminds us that God's image in *every* human being gives infinite value and significance even to our fiercest 'rivals' and 'competitors'. It enables us to aspire to something better than a rat race of continually trying to push ourselves forward at the expense of other people. The "peace and goodwill" of which shepherds heard angels sing is not some sort of vague, impossible dream, but the reality of what life in this world is intended to be about. So the challenge to each of us is to respond to God's invitation to join with him in taking small, but nonetheless positive, steps towards this reality. It's something each one of us can do, both in the way we live among people we encounter day by day and in the way we think and speak about politicians and others who are so much in the public eye and whose words and decisions affect the lives of millions.

Bampton Parish Council

At the recent meeting of the Parish Council there was discussion on several topics ranging from potholes and excess water on the road near Woodfoot to the current state of the village recreation field. It was agreed that the council would foot the cost of the digitisation of the Tinclar Library archive which was carried out by Chris Cant.

The budget for 2020-21 which had been prepared by the Clerk was discussed and agreed with minor alterations. The precept for the next year was set at £6540, a slight increase on the current year. This increase is to create a capital fund to cover the future cost of maintaining the street lights that the council has taken over from EDC. For the next few years EDC will give a grant towards the costs but this will diminish year on year and finally cease until the whole cost will be borne by Bampton PC.

You may have noticed that BT is proposing to remove the service from two phone boxes in the parish because of a lack of use over the last year – the box at Bampton Grange was apparently only used 5 times and that at Burnbanks 43 times. The council knows that the box at Burnbanks is an important asset especially for walkers on the Coast to Coast walk as there is little or no mobile signal in the area and councillors are keen to push for retention of the box. The box at Grange should also be retained but if it can't be saved it could be bought for the princely sum of £1 like the one at Knipe and perhaps used for an additional defibrillator or as a mini-library or book exchange point.

Several councillors have had concerns over the appearance of the village, especially the roadside verges and there have been discussions over how best to treat them. Should they be cut more frequently to present a more manicured appearance or left uncut in places to encourage wildlife? It has been decided that the extreme edges should be cut where necessary for visibility for drivers and other areas should be sown with wild flowers in the spring. A Boon Day will be organised to carry this out at the appropriate time and with assistance from the RSPB.

The next council meeting will be on Tuesday, January 21st 2020 at 7.30 pm and you are welcome to attend.

If you think you'd like to join the team and help provide essential emergency cover for the local community please feel free to get in contact with me for an informal chat or look at the NWAS CFR page http://www.nwas-responders.info/

All applications are submitted through the web page and are confidential.

If you feel unwell and think it is a medical emergency DIAL 999 or 112 and ask for AMBULANCE. Any on call CFR's will then be tasked by Ambulance control to attend if appropriate. CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest, some trauma. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12.

Extracts from '100 Years Ago' in the Herald November 2019

Cold and wet.

Miss M. E. Noble (Bampton Grange), now a Counter-Clerk at Penrith Post Office, is to be a telephone operator there, from next week (report Saturday 8th). Mardale Shepherds Meet, Saturday 22nd Dun Bull Hotel. The Ullswater Foxhounds meet there at 9.30am.

There were 212 stray sheep penned; 209 of them were claimed.

Penrith County Court, Friday 21st in which J.W. Cowperthwaite from near Aysgarth sued Thomas Relph, farmer, Drybarrows, for selling him a horse that arrived maimed. Court awarded JWC the full £56 + costs. The pair fell into conversation in Shap on 7th April; TR said "I've got a horse that would suit you. It'll be £56. I'll send it." JWC trusted him and agreed.

To let in Mardale (Advt., 1st Nov):

- 1. Chapel Hill Farm, house + 185 acres + fellrights + 344 heafed Herdwicks.
- 2. Riggindale Farm, house + 257 acres + fellrights + 690 heafed Herdwicks.

December 1919

Stormy first week, then as usual.

Coal famine by 15th. Meat ceased to be rationed on and after the 15th.

Roughill School (built by Miss Mary Noble, to save the Carhullan children the walk to Bampton School) held a Whist Drive, Dance and Supper, Friday evening 12th, for the fund for a Christmas Tree and Summer Trip for the local children. It went very well.

Saturday 27th December was an extra Public Holiday and the banks were also closed on 1st January.
