## Dear Friends

February in the church calendar is an important month as we celebrate three significant events.

First, the Presentation of Christ in the Temple also known as Candlemas on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> February. This is when Jesus as the first-born male is brought to the Temple by Mary and Joseph under the Old Testament Law according to Moses and is consecrated (given) for blessing to the Lord God. The event is made even more important because Simeon who has been told he will not die before he had seen the Lord Christ or Messiah, is led by the Holy Spirit and encounters Mary and Joseph and takes Jesus in his arms and declares that he is God's salvation (saving presence for humanity). Likewise, a prophet called Anna who is at the same time in the Temple, implicitly recognises who Jesus is and gives thanks to God.

Secondly, on 25<sup>th</sup> February we have pancake day known properly as Shrove Tuesday. Traditionally the precursor to Easter of 40 days and nights (not counting Sundays) of fasting that we call Lent and recalls Jesus' time in the desert as he prepares himself for his mission and ministry. Pancake day lets people use up all the prescribed foods that could not be eaten during this period in times past, particularly the fats and cream that would be used in the pancakes, accompanied by

games and festivities – notably street football! This practice of Shrove or Shriven is the origin of the Mardi Gras.

Thirdly, the next day we have Ash Wednesday, a solemn season of reflection and meditation, renewal of faith and self-examination. This penance was observed by many in a public display, clad in sackcloth and covered in ashes, a phrase coined by the Old testament prophets. These days, for those who observe the ceremony, it is more sanitised in the context usually of Holy Communion. The previous years Palm crosses are burnt and mixed with oil, blessed and are used to mark a cross on the forehead of those present with suitable words.

All these events are part of what we do as Christians to show our commitment in following Jesus as a disciple and living out our faith together. They remind us of the path we profess to tread and bind us together in unity.

Then there is March and the continuing challenge of Lent and even austerity as we look towards Easter and new life, but that's for the next edition and writer.

Meanwhile we are called each in our own way to use this time to draw closer to God, and deepen our spiritual understanding, so that our lives are enriched and positively enhanced. This may be achieved by a more determined effort to pray, reading the bible or spending time in contemplation and possibly silence. Whatever way we choose I hope it will be a beneficial time for you in preparing your hearts and minds for the glory of Easter Day.

This week the team, with some members from neighbouring teams, completed their annual Safeguarding training which is a requirement of NWAS and ensures that vulnerable patients in our area can be identified and offered appropriate support and help. It was a very useful session and everyone who attended improved their knowledge in this area.

If you think you'd like to join the team and help provide essential emergency cover for the local community please feel free to get in contact with me for an informal chat or look at the NWAS CFR page <u>http://www.nwas-responders.info/</u> All applications are submitted through the web page and are confidential.

If you feel unwell and think it is a medical emergency DIAL 999 or 112 and ask for AMBULANCE. Any on call CFR's will then be tasked by Ambulance control to attend if appropriate. CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest, some trauma. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12.

#### Rainfall 2019 – Mill Craggs – Bampton – Another Dry Year

I hear repeated moans about what a rubbish year 2019 was weather wise, but this is a false perception as those of us who completed the first half of the Coast to Coast walk over 8 days in May and September will confirm: not a spot of rain and warm sun.

January was a dry month, only 29% of average rainfall but chilly especially the last few days which continued into the first week of February. However the month turned unseasonally warm. Storms Gareth and Hannah contributed to the wettest March I have recorded. Mid-April and the whole of May were warm and dry. But June was another story: a miserable first three weeks but picked up in time for Bampton Sports before the rain set in – yes it was a wet summer. October to the end of the year was dry in terms of average because there was no very heavy period of rainfall. The coldest night of the year was  $30^{th}/31^{st}$  January when the thermometer fell to -9.7c.

#### **Bampton Parish Council**

At the recent meeting of the Parish Council several Highways issues were raised – blocked culverts in various locations causing excessive water on the roads and other problems - which will be reported by Jim Campbell the parish Highwaysman. A risk management assessment prepared by the Clerk was discussed and accepted along with the register of assets. It was agreed that the Clerk's computer which is jointly owned with Askham PC should be written off before a new clerk takes over at the beginning of the next financial year as it is now over seven years old.

A report on the position of the footway lighting in the village drawn up by Mike Dyke was discussed. Four lights were transferred to the ownership of the PC from EDC and they will be partially funded on a sliding scale until 2022 when the PC will be solely responsible for maintenance and electricity supply Other 'not approved' lights will be maintained by EDC until they become 'economically unviable' to repair when they will be decommissioned. This is all extremely complicated and will be discussed again and again! The parish precept was increased slightly for the coming year to start building up a capital fund to finance the lights in the future.

It was decided that there would be another Boon Day before Easter to tidy the verges and other areas and also to sow wild flowers to improve the habitat for wildlife on the roadside. Willing helpers most welcome. Watch out for posters! You may have noticed that the willow tunnel in the play area is very rampant, somewhat resembling a jungle. This will be tamed by cutting several times in the coming year.

The current councillors are: Jim Campbell (Chairman), Mike Dyke (Vice Chairman), Ray Bruin, Rich Shave, Pete Salway, India Tuer and Neil Hughes.
