## Dear Friends

It will be well into the New Year when you receive this but I do send you all my very best wishes for 2022. Let's hope that it is the year when Covid is finally brought under control, so it becomes more like flu, and that we can return to living "normal" lives. Let's hope, too, that the pledges made at the Glasgow summit meeting on climate change are kept and all countries begin to take the threat to our planet seriously.

Christmas is well and truly over, but I am now looking again at the cards, letters and emails I received from friends from all periods of my life and from many parts of the world. Although I quite understand my granddaughter's decision not to send cards because of the millions of trees that are felled to produce them and because she feels that she would rather give the money that she would have spent on cards and postage to various charities, yet I am very glad that many people do not feel that way. I enjoy receiving them so much and without them I think that I would have lost touch with many people; they have helped to keep friendships and family links alive.

They have also brought back many happy memories of times spent with various people. One card that I received was from a friend whom I have known since I was three and we started nursery school together just after the World War 2 was over. It made me remember playing in the Wendy House with her, mostly happily, but occasionally squabbling over whose turn it was to act as mother. I also remembered very happy times when we were both brownies and then both guides. Then there was the email from Nazarius, now a professor at Makerere University in Uganda, who visited us at Christmas in the 1990s, his visit organized by the charity Host which arranges for overseas students, often very lonely during vacations, to spend time with ordinary families in the UK. He has visited several times since then, once with his wife Regina, and has kept me up to date with his family news and photographs.

What a joy it is to have friends, particularly the one or two close friends you know you can always call upon in an emergency, with whom you can share your worries, sorrows and frustrations as well as your happiness.

Jesus was that sort of friend. He was not a loner, nor someone who was admired and trusted but who was up there on a pedestal. In many places in the gospels we read of him being with his <u>friends</u>, going to weddings with them, eating with them, going out in their boats, being part of their day to day lives. And Christians believe he can be that sort of friend to us still, that today we can still share our sorrows and joys with him, still ask for his guidance. Of course we call it praying, not talking, and think of him as the Spirit of God alive in the world today rather than as a 1<sup>st</sup> century Palestinian man, but it is that relationship with him, with God, that keeps Christians throughout the world, even those facing persecution and even death for their beliefs, his faithful followers.

Enjoy your friends this year; enjoy football matches, shopping trips, meals out, walks, an evening at the pub, laughing together, or anything else that you like to do with them. For friendship and love are the things which will last and bring us real joy.

# Red Kite (Milvus milvus) – A First for me in the Lowther Valley

My daughter alerted me to a red kite flying round over the Howes and Ireland Wood on the afternoon of Monday  $3^{rd}$  January. We watched this beautiful bird for about 5 minutes before it drifted eastwards towards the river. I discovered subsequently that it was seen that morning sitting on a post near the river and then again in a tree near the suspension bridge on the  $6^{th}$ . A third bigger than the common buzzard it is unmistakable with a deeply forked tail which is flicked constantly and large white wing patches.

Was this bird from Dumfries and Galloway, Grizedale where 90 birds were released in the early 2010s, or maybe the NE where more birds were released this century and as many as 70 have been counted in one roost?

I would appreciate receiving any more reports of sightings. Who knows, perhaps we will have a breeding pair in time.

# Rainfall 2021 – Mill Craggs – Bampton – A Year of Highs and Lows

Quite a change from 2020. January unseasonably dry despite Storm Christoph. 19 days when the temperature dipped below 0c. The dry and chilly weather continued for first half of February, coldest night of year  $10^{th}/11^{th}$ , but from  $14^{th}$  to  $25^{th}$  235mm of rain fell of which 82mm fell on  $24^{th}$  with the inevitable floods. More floods were suffered on  $10^{th}/11^{th}$  and  $28^{th}/29^{th}$  March.

The next quarter, April to June, was a wet May sandwiched between a very dry April and June. Not good for grass and vegetable growth.

The drier than average weather continued through July, August and September with only 51% of average rainfall and +30c highs in July.

October was a very wet beginning and ending with more floods. However November redressed the balance despite Storm Arwen and year ended very mild 11.2c on New Year's Eve. Overall average rainfall in total, but peaks and troughs.

January 2022 is looking like being less than 50% of average rainfall, but what will February bring or for that matter the rest of the year? Like Boris unpredictable!

If you feel unwell and think it is a medical emergency DIAL 999 or 112 and ask for AMBULANCE. Any on call CFR's will then be tasked by Ambulance control to attend if appropriate. CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest, some trauma. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12.
