Hello,

I came to serve, not to be served

I hope you had a good coronation weekend, whatever the occasion meant to you. In our schools, I was very impressed with the knowledge and understanding of our young people: a large number had watched on TV, and spoke with their usual thoughtfulness and insight about what they had seen.

For some of us, the occasion will have been deeply important. For others (including many interviewed by the newspapers) it was a good reason to party, or to bring community together. For a significant minority, it represented the continuation of a political settlement that they believe to be inappropriate in a modern democracy. In all three categories, our attitude to the spectacle of the morning, the Westminster Abbey service, and the procession which followed, will vary from delight and fascination, through disinterest, even to revulsion.

Church of England clergy are among those who must take oaths of loyalty to the monarch and their lawful successors, so you will not find me advocating a Republic. But I do celebrate and give thanks that we live in a society which is so comfortable with itself, that it can even tolerate dissent about who our Head of State should be. In many nations of the world, disagreement on such a point is well within the sphere of offences that might result in our disappearance, imprisonment or torture. Defending the right of those we disagree with to express their disagreement publicly and forcefully (and, up to a point, inconveniently) is an essential precaution against the possibility that our own legitimate views and rights will be trampled on.

Whatever we make of royalty, let's focus on the opening words of the coronation, which set the expectation for all that followed. A young chorister stood boldly before the King and said, "Your Majesty, as children of the Kingdom of God, we welcome you in the name of the King of Kings." The King replied, "In his name, and after his example, I come not to be served but to serve." It's a promise, using Jesus' own words, that each of us should be able to make and mean. The world would truly be transformed by it.

North Westmorland News

I believe that June sees the last mass-printed copy of North Westmorland News, which will hereafter follow many other local and specialist publications into a predominantly, but not exclusively, electronic distribution. As a former editor of a print parish magazine, I know and understand very well their value, and also the enormous effort they involve in editing and production. So I would like to add my personal thanks and applause (as something of a latecomer to the scene) for Alex, who continues to edit the magazine; and for all those who over the years have been involved in the herculean tasks of editing and distribution. Regrettably, we cannot argue with the judgment of parish treasurers that the annual loss on production costs of £6,000 (when other ministries are being cut) was neither sustainable, nor capable of simple remedy.

Do remember that, in addition to the direct email distribution of the magazine and its availability online, the option remains for those who need it to receive a hard copy of the magazine. I, for one, will be happy to run a few off on my printer each month and drop them off for you.

Some will be reading this in newsletters which are already electronic, others in print magazines funded by different means. Do give thanks for, and support to, all those who make community and church communications possible. The labour, I know well, is significant, but the value is great.

Educational Grants: The Bampton Endowed Schools Endowment

Last year the Charity made 13 grants totalling £4,550 to local young people. These awards were mainly to help them financially while they took part in a variety of post-16 educational courses at college, university, sixth-form or while undertaking apprenticeships.

The Trustees now invite applications for financial support from those who will be undertaking courses at any university, college or institution of higher or further education or at sixth-form level, in autumn 2023. Consideration will also be given to applications from those who will be taking part in other forms of post-16 education (including the study of music or other arts) to prepare for entry into any occupation, trade or profession.

To be eligible the applicant must be:

- Under the age of 25 on 1st September 2023
- Resident in the civil parish of Bampton, Cumbria or to have attended Bampton Endowed School.

Bampton Community First Responder Team

The team have been continuing to meet up to train with our last training session being on Burns with the emphasis being on cooling the burnt area as quickly as possible under cool running water for at least 20 mins. This first aid intervention can be undertaken by anyone and can make a huge difference to the amount of damage caused. We also recapped on Wounds and Bleeding with the focus being on control of catastrophic haemorrhage or a 'big bleed'. We discussed what is classed as a 'big bleed', when and how to apply a tourniquet and next steps in treatment. The next team meeting will be coming up soon and we will continue to train to be ready to help the community when needed.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has recently donated to the Bampton CFR team. It is very much appreciated. The team are very fortunate to be in a good financial position due to the previous fundraising efforts of the community, however, with our equipment nearing the end of its life we will need to start replacing it soon. If you think you'd like to join the team and help provide essential emergency cover for the local community please feel free to get in contact with me for an informal chat or look at the NWAS CFR page http://www.nwas-responders.info/ All applications are submitted through the web page and are confidential.

If you feel unwell and think it is a medical emergency DIAL 999 or 112 and ask for AMBULANCE. Any on call CFR's will then be tasked by Ambulance control to attend if appropriate. CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest, some trauma. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12.

Extracts from '100 Years Ago' in the Herald

Bampton 1801 – 1829

(Mainly from Parson and White's Directory, 1829)

Bampton parish had 600 people in the 1801 Census; 595 in 1811's; and 614 in 1821's. Its soil in the valley bottom was very fertile. The two ancient owners were Patrick de Culwen and one of the Cundales, whence its two parts' names of Bampton Patrick and Bampton Cundale.

The de Culwens became Curwens of Workington. By 1770 Bampton Patrick belonged to Francis Warwick Esq. (of Warwick near Carlisle), who sold it in 1772 and died soon after. His purchaser was E. W. Hasell Esq. of Dalemain, whose ancestor was Lady Anne's steward.

Bampton Cunsdale was sold to the Clyburnes of Cliburn, who sold it to the Lowthers.

Thornthwaite was originally a thorny clearing in a large forest; it was there by 1274. By 1829 its manor house (Thornthwaite Hall) had a road to it from Bampton. The road's name was (is) Walmgate, there by 1366, when it ran through land full of snakes (grass-snakes, slow-worms, adders etc.) as its name shows.

The parish had three libraries, begun in 1710, 1750 1757, comprising a total of 800 books, open to Bampton parishioners. It had three schools, each endowed to help pay the running costs, viz the Grammar School, (which) ranks as high as any in the county, founded by the Rev. Dr. Sutton, 1623, endowed with over £80 p.a. (now in 2023 = over £8,000); Measand Free School, est. 1713, worth £40 p.a.; and Rough Hill School, est. 1662 by Edmund Noble and worth £9 p.a., taught by Miss Ann Noble. The Master of the Grammar School is the Rev. John Bowstead these 52 years; he ran it as a boarding school; high standard. He was also Curate of Mardale.

The local bus
