# **Knipe Road Cemetery**

The cemetery on the Knipe road has been in use for over a century since the closure of the churchyard at St. Patrick's church in Bampton Grange. All residents of the parish are entitled to be buried there, and the names of many generations of Bampton families are inscribed on the tombstones as memorials to loved ones.

As a "closed churchyard", the churchyard at St. Patrick's in Bampton Grange is maintained by Eden District Council at the expense of all Council tax payers in the district, but the Knipe road cemetery is owned, operated and maintained by the local Parochial Church Council (PCC) of St. Patrick's church.

The maintenance of the cemetery, (mainly grass cutting), has traditionally been carried out by volunteers, often on "Boon Days", and in recent years, under the leadership of Chris Holme. Together with a diminishing band of helpers Chris has done a wonderful job in overseeing the maintenance of the cemetery, but due to increasing infirmity, feels that he can no longer carry on with this role at the same level. The PCC is extremely grateful to Chris for the dedication which he has brought to this task for many years.

The PCC is seeking to increase the number of helpers willing to assist in keeping the cemetery under control, and invites all of those willing to help to make contact with one of the churchwardens or any member of the PCC.

### **Church Bells**

The Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) has confirmed their agreement for the Faculty application. Final approval will be confirmed from the Diocesan Chancellor when the period of public consultation has expired. Over the coming weeks work will continue on developing the appeal for financial support with further details to be set out in a forthcoming issue of the Parish Newsletter.

In anticipation of a successful appeal for the new bells, the present bell chimers (and apprentice bell ringers!) are making progress in acquiring the necessary skills to be able to do justice to the new bells.

We have been having tuition from the bell captain at St. Michael's, Shap and also the bells' sponsor Jim Crowther. Recently, at the invitation of Ron East the Diocesan Bell Adviser, we visited a bell ringers practice at Carlisle Cathedral where we were made very welcome and left with positive vibes.

One interesting aspect to the new bells project is the information emerging about the church bells, exemplified by the poem below which was found very recently by Marilyn Bowness among some papers that originally came from her great aunt, Renee Ridley, who kept the Helton 'jerry' around the time of World War II. How Renee came to have this poem from over a century earlier is unknown.

The writer has, though, been identified as John Foster Parr – the son of a Liverpool surgeon who was born in Liverpool on 23<sup>rd</sup> November 1818 and christened at St. Mark's Church, Liverpool on 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1818. Some time before the 1841 census John came to Bampton as a boarder with the then Vicar, William Hodgson, was still there in 1851 but by the 1861 census had moved to Drax in Yorkshire – still a boarder, with the Vicar there. He continued to live there, as a boarder for many years before moving into alternative accommodation before his death in early 1902 aged 83.

It is perhaps no surprise therefore that having lived for around 20 years within the sound of 'Bampton Bells' he should come to write this lovely poem:-

# The Bampton Bells

The lark sings merrily in the sky, When the blossom is on the thorn, But merrier far are the Bampton Bells, In the calm of a Sabbath morn. Sweet in the grove is the blackbirds' song, In the bull of the evening air. But sweeter the sound of the Bampton Bells, When they ring to the Vesper Prayer. On Sabbath morn and on Sabbath eve, The sound of sweet church bells, With a tremulous music floats away, O'er the brows of the rocky fells. And far, far off by the lone lake's shore, Their plaintive cadence falls, Where the whispering wave, with its silvery voice, To the spirit of Solitude calls. Bright shines the sun, sweet sound the

In their best array, at the summons come
With lightsome step and glad.
There one of three-score years and ten,
Goes bent with the weight of time,

bells.

And he thinks of his youth, and his friends who are dead,

As he hears the old Bells chime.

And there comes a maid by that hawthorn hedge,

But her thoughts not with the old man's go

To the past, where the dead repose.

Her fancy paints, in brightest hues,

The future hours of her life,

And little she dreams of the woes wherewith

Those future hours are rife.

Long, long have you rung, sweet Village Bells,

Blest is your call, for you summon to God,

And blest those souls that hear;

When the world's last funeral peal shall be rung,

Those souls shall have nought to fear.

### **Bampton Memorial Hall**

Annual Report of the Trustees for the Year 1st April 2015 to 31st March 2016

The Memorial Hall has had another successful year, continuing the high level of usage evident in recent years. Events take place on most days with a very wide range of activities involved. The Parish Council, WI, Bampton Local History Society, Indoor Bowls, Pilates, Yoga and a Dominoes Group continue their regular use although we are sorry that lack of toddlers in the village has resulted in the Red Squirrels Toddler Group coming to a close after 10 years; further action required perhaps? Bampton Cinema goes from strength to strength and provides a valued regular social occasion. Bampton First Responders use the Hall for their regular training sessions and a hugely successful Big Breakfast was held during the year as a fund raising event for the team. A refresher First Aid course was held in December and 12 participants from around the village all gained their Outdoor Emergency First Aid certificates. And a Macmillan Coffee Morning at the Hall produced an outstanding response. As part of its role as a community resource, the Hall is a regular venue for private celebratory and memorial events.

The Hall also provides the base for Bampton Sports Day, for the Raft and Duck races on the river and for the Winter Sports.

Regular users of the hall facilities from outside the parish included the RSPB, Mountain Rescue, Scouts and United Utilities. Once again the Eden Runners' Half Marathon was based at the Hall, this year in excellent conditions for running. A team of Hall and WI volunteers again provided a wide range of refreshments and the event was deemed a great success. The event provides a welcome income to the Hall as well as achieving good publicity for the village and the Hall facilities. The field adjacent to the Hall is now a popular venue for camping groups who welcome the combination of Hall facilities and open air space.

This was not a 'pantomime year' but an Olde Time Music Hall was held in November – a Victorian evening of singing, dancing, melodrama, monologues .... a myriad of merrymaking for delectation and delight proved a great success. The next Pantomime follows in January 2017.

As in recent years significant sums of money were spent on maintenance and improvements to the two Halls. The outside windows and doors in both Halls were repainted and the inside of the large Hall and the kitchen were also redecorated. New security lighting was fitted and a new fire alarm system installed in the Main Hall. A further 50 new chairs were purchased during the year so we now have 100 new chairs of two different designs so as to fit various shapes and sizes of users. A new bench was installed in the adjacent play area, purchased with the funds remaining from the Jubilee events.

The cost of maintaining the Hall continues to rise and so it is vital that the many sources of income keep growing. These include Hall lettings (£4,840 this year),

the 50:50 Club (a net income after distribution of prizes of £576), income from the PV panels on the roof (£1,963), from the recycling facility (£499) and car parking fees (£182). Major expenses included insurance (£970), water, electricity and gas (£1,075), decorating and other repairs (£5,421) and purchase of equipment including the chairs (£2,025). The total income during the year was £12,980 while expenditure was £14,568, a 'loss' of £1,588. This compares with a surplus of £2,629 in the previous year. The Hall has a reserve fund of about £10,000 and so is in reasonable financial shape.

During the year the committee agreed to simplify the way in which electricity use is charged to hirers of the hall by doing away with separate charging for electricity and to include the cost of electricity within the hire charge. No change was made in the hire charge for local hirers, so resulting in a small overall reduction in the total cost of hiring the Halls for local hirers. For hirers from outside the local area a small increase in hire charge was agreed, this being calculated to maintain the total hiring income to the Hall plus electricity costs at their current levels.

The committee was delighted that Julian Russell has agreed to act as Health and Safety Advisor to the committee. Julian will carry out regular safety inspections and bring any matters of concern to the committee, as well as regularly reviewing the Hall documentation related to Safety Policy, Risk Assessment and the Fire Emergency Plans. Julian has considerable expertise in these areas and we are grateful for his involvement in these important areas for the Hall.

Fortunately the floods around the turn of the year did not do any damage to the fabric of the Halls although the car parking areas were left with a large amount of debris. A grand turnout of volunteers helped to clear this up and demonstrated the community commitment to the Halls.

As always the Hall can only continue to operate because of the voluntary help of many in the village. The Trustees wish to thank all who have contributed to the success of the Hall during the past year. Particular thanks are due to the Trustees and Committee members who devote much time to ensuring the continuing success of the Hall.

### The 106 Bus Partnership

The 106 bus partnership is seeking contributions from residents to keep the 106 service on the road. Communities along the route were devastated when the bus was withdrawn from service in 2014 following local authority cuts to the transport budget. Reacting to the loss, a group of activists got together to 'bring back the 106'. Following months of hard work the bus eventually ran again from February 2015, with one 'there and back' run per day for just three days a week. Following a successful first year the partnership extended the service to 5 days a week and commission an additional run back from Kendal in the holidays when the college service (506) does not run. The new service is financially underwritten by the 106 Partnership, a group of dedicated volunteers who raise money to pay the shortfall between the money the service takes from passengers and the cost to run the bus.

Many residents recognise the value of a regular bus service to their community but are not always bus users. Most would like to help to keep the bus running either via a one off donation or a regular subscription. The 106 Partnership invite residents to make a financial donation to help keep the bus running. This can be done by a number of different methods. Either by sending a cheque (payable to '106 Partnership') to The 106 Treasurer, Chris Battersby, Aysgarth, Eamont Bridge, Penrith, CA10 2BH or setting up a standing order to make a regular donation (a few pounds per month could make a real difference). Please telephone Chris (01768 866670) for account details if you would like to set up a regular donation. Alternatively you can leave a donation at Shap Charity Shop in an envelope marked for the 106 Bus Service.

The 106 Bus service is currently supported by Parish Councils from along the route of the service, plus Eden Housing Association, Penrith Town Council and Kendal Business Improvement District. The 106 Partnership needs to raise £10,000 to keep the service running and every little helps so please give what you can to secure this vital service for a long-term future. # **Bampton Parish Council**

At the recent meeting of the Parish Council Mike Dyke was co-opted to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Bethany Leckie and he was welcomed by the other councillors.

Mr Carruthers reported that the application to LDNPA for a grant towards the cost of the upgrading of the parking area by Grange Bridge had been successful and that £1,000 would be given when the work had been completed. Highways will be carrying out the work when they can.

The state of the village notice boards was discussed and it was agreed that a wood effect one would be ordered to replace the one by the Church which is in poor repair. Please remember that notice boards are there to serve the community as a place for advertising events and for public information. Bus shelters will be cleaned and freshened up shortly.

Library users will have noticed that the mobile service has now been withdrawn because the vans have become too old to economically keep in service. There has been a suggestion that there could be a book drop service instead so that those library users who cannot get to Penrith or Shap libraries could have a selection of books somewhere in the village. Anyone who is interested in running this should contact Kay Metcalfe of Cumbria Library Service – contact details should be on the CCC web-site. Alternatively the Old Courthouse in Shap is open for some hours every day of the week for the self service library. Opening times are on the Memorial Hall notice board.

The Council was asked to sign a petition to Parliament requesting the designation of the Coast to Coast Walk as a National Trail. This could lead to more funding for the upkeep of the route and perhaps greater usage and economic benefit to places along the way. The Council agreed to sign.

The next meeting of the Council will be on **Wednesday 21**<sup>st</sup> **September** and all are welcome.

# **Bampton Community First Responders**

Bampton CFR team hosted a very successful defibrillator awareness drop in session on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> June in the Post Office tea room. The objective of this session was to de-mystify defibrillators and encourage people to use one as soon as possible in the event of someone having a cardiac arrest. This could be before the arrival of an ambulance or perhaps even a CFR team member. We looked at when a defibrillator should be used, what comes with the defibrillator, how to use it (switch it on and follow the prompts!) and basic chest

compression. Two trainer defibrillators and an 'Annie' dummy were available to allow some 'hands-on' practice. Between 15 and 20 people attended and all said it had been very beneficial and they were now much more confident in using the defibrillator if necessary. Should anyone else like a talk through on its use please contact Christine Hill. A big thank you to John and Janet at the Post Office for the use of the tea room and to all the CFR team members who helped on the day and with advertising prior to the event.

The Bampton CFR team are also very pleased to welcome a new member to the team. Vickie Haddock has successfully completed the CFR training and is now a fully fledged team member. Vaugh Steel was the focus of the 'summer walk' courtesy of Catherine Lacey and members were intrigued to see how a relatively modest farmhouse and outbuildings had been transformed into a modern eco-friendly home with global impact. A great contrast with this was the final talk of this session. Barry McKay described the role of 'The Cumbrian Chapman' who in the 18<sup>th</sup> century brought news of the wider world to places like Bampton by distributing news on foot or by word of mouth. They

were the internet of their day through which information, political manifestos and gossip passed in ballads and broadsheets, many printed in Penrith.

This year's BBQ and summer party was held in blustery conditions on Tuesday, July 5<sup>th</sup> at Nick and Lizzie Lindwall's in Rosgill. In the last parish newsletter I flagged up that we were planning some innovations this year.
