
BAMPTON PARISH NEWSLETTER OCTOBER - NOVEMBER 2017



Dear Friends

We can't help being influenced by the beauty of local scenery, even when, as now, the best Autumn conditions are beginning to fade as we head towards winter following an intermittent-only summer!

The extent to which our worldview is changed by the place we live in and what happens in it is considerable. If we spend most of our time in quite a small community and like the things that go on there – church, social activities, visits to neighbours or family – we are likely to want to protect it and keep much the same as it always was; this is only natural. New national or international trends – even spread of internet capacity and mobile telephony(!) – reaches the countryside more slowly and it's quite right that we test what we see and hear first before automatically assuming that anything new is good, simply because it's novel. Nevertheless our planet and its societies is constantly adapting to suit human convenience and its best at least to keep alert to what is fresh even if we don't necessarily like it all!

What doesn't differ much, however much technology there is around is, sadly, man's aptitude to do harm – to others, to our environment – as much as good. Christianity has always tried to explain why this is so and Jesus himself made many attempts to clarify the race's perverser ways to his disciples, but for many

this factor is a barrier hindering them from showing further interest in the things of faith. If God is good, loves us and wants us to be happy then why does the Deity allow such terrible outrages as the Grenfell tower fire, airline crashes and hi-jacks, famines and wars, to continue? So the argument tends to run.

However to take such a line is hugely to over-simplify God. We do not of course know – or ever could know – sufficient about the Creator of the universe to be able to come to a wholly human-centred judgment. Being just such a Creator however, – and we see the vast diversity of the earth before us, with all its good and bad – God wished to allow that humanity whose very existence He permitted the fullest opportunity to become what it itself desired to become, be this healthy and strong, negative and weak, or somewhere in-between. Jesus explained to those who would be His followers throughout all time that God our Father does give us choice to develop more or less as we wish, and that any judgment would only be made at the end of all things; and after many warnings and much guidance – most notably in the Bible – had been given.

So: Grenfell tower, just like the tower of Babel which also ended in disaster, was built by those who did not take sufficient advice! Aircraft are also built by human beings with limited skills, not by angels.

Hi-jacks, wars and famines too all occur either because someone at one point or another has either been negligent (e.g. failure to provide water wells or aid to famished lands) or wilful e.g. an individual or group, or even a nation, desiring to force their own will on to others, irrespective of what existing national agreements, treaties or straightforward prudence might dictate.

A loving God, who is the supreme legislator of all does not intend to force humanity into tight, ready-made boxes but longs for us all to explore the full proliferation of potential of His vast and complex creation.

Through the intervention of Jesus Christ, who loved humanity so much that he gave his life for it, God wishes to try to love Him back; but this a decision for us to make, with His support, if we care to – He won't compel us to make it. *Neil*

Bampton Shop and Tearoom

Olivia and Graham would like to thank everyone, from daily visitors to the shop, to those who pop in occasionally, and visiting tourists too, for your continued support of the Bampton Shop and Tearoom.

For the time being our opening hours will remain the same: mornings only Monday to Wednesday 8.30am-1pm, and all day Thursday to Saturday 8.30am-5pm and 10am-5pm on Sunday, but as we head into winter we may look at amending these times slightly. We've noticed that the bulk of our local shoppers come in the mornings, with only one or two people popping in most afternoons, so we will look at this over the next month or so. Post Office hours are set by Post Office Ltd, and will remain, as always 9am to 1pm Monday, and 9am to 12pm Tuesday and Wednesday.

Our shop continues to stock local products such as meats from Low Howgill butchers in Appleby, cheeses from Appleby Creamery, butter from Wintertarn at Morland, beers from Eden Brewery, Appleby Brewery, and Hawkshead Brewery, tea and coffee from Farrar's of Kendal, and of course fudge and Kendal mint cake from Romneys of Kendal. Even more locally, we have jams and pickles from Jeannie, and honey from the Lowther Estate.

We also sell local maps, cards by Christine Longmire, and postcards by Olivia and Graham, as well as a range of local books. We have started increasing our stock of magazines too, and local ones such as Cumbria Life, Cumbria, and Lakeland Walker are proving very popular. We welcome David Kitchen from Bampton Grange on to the team.

The venue is Bampton Memorial Hall: film begins at 7:30pm, doors opening at 7pm. Tickets are on sale at the door on the night, price £5 adults, £2 U16. Or, a film plus supper ticket can be bought at Bampton Post Office, price £10 adults; £7 for U16 in advance. We will restrict numbers for supper to 36 so buy early. Menu details in post office; supper served at 6pm; bar, ice-creams and an interval as always.

A word about the first 2 films:

Lion is a real-life odyssey about an adopted child, Saroo, adapted from Saroo Brierley's memoir A Long Way Home. We meet 5 year old Saroo (played by Sunny Pawar making his screen debut) in 1986 as the well-loved son of a warm, caring but poverty-stricken family in the Hindi state of Madhya Pradesh. By sheer accident while out scavenging with his older brother he is whisked away hundreds of miles by train to the teeming, alien city of Calcutta where he barely survives as a street urchin until picked up and sent to an orphanage. Soon, he is selected to be adopted by the Brierley family in Tasmania where he grows up in a loving prosperous home. Some 20 years later, Saroo (played by Dev Patel), becomes increasingly driven by memories of his lost family and begins to search for them. Lion received many BAFTA awards.

Rachel is our period drama is set in 1850s Cornwall, a perfect "Poldark" setting for Daphne du Maurier's classic tale of lust and paranoia. A young Englishman, Philip Ashley (Sam Clafflin) plots revenge on his mysterious, beautiful cousin Rachel (played coincidentally by Rachel Weisz), believing that she murdered his beloved guardian Ambrose after their marriage. (Ambrose died suddenly from a brain tumour but not before Philip received deranged letters from him, implying he was being poisoned.) But Philip's feelings change dramatically when he meets Rachel and falls under the beguiling spell of her charms. Is she the wicked guilty woman he first believes her to be or is she entirely innocent of intrigue and murder and just trying to survive in a man's world stacked against her? There is always her little suitcase full of mysterious potions from which she concocts strange herbal teas... to keep you in suspense.....

There will also be one or two short films this season, very popular additions to the evening's entertainment. Happy viewing and we look forward to seeing you very soon.

Bampton Parish Council

In the absence of Richard Carruthers Vicki Buss took the chair for the September Parish Council meeting. Jim Campbell was unanimously co-opted to serve as a councillor in place of Vicky Haddock who resigned earlier. He was welcomed and she was thanked for the work she did while a councillor.

Several parishioners were present and they raised concerns over several things – uncut verges, blocked gullies and rubbish bags being torn open by scavengers while awaiting collection. The relevant authorities will be contacted and made aware of these problems and hopefully something may be done to solve them. Another matter raised was the current lack of a parish Highwayman since the very sad death of Malcolm Evans who was very assiduous in the post for many years. The Highwayman/woman is the link between the parish and the Highways authority and he /she passes on complaints and information about such things as dangerous potholes, blocked and overflowing ditches and culverts, empty grit bins and any other road related problems. It is an important job! There is a direct line that anyone can use to report problems but the Highwayman has a personal contact and can get things done more effectively sometimes. If you are interested in taking this on please contact me or Neil Hughes for more information. Thank you. Still on Highway matters - it was reported that new signage is being put up at the Whale road end on Knipe Moor and road markings to try to prevent drivers continuing straight on to Low Knipe when they intend to go to Askham. New road markings are noticeable throughout the parish.

The Clerk gave a report on a course she had attended during the summer to learn more about the law relating to commons and village greens. Interesting but very complicated!

It was decided that in future planning applications will be listed on the parish web-site when they are sent for consultation. This means that anyone with an interest in knowing what is being proposed can access the plans via the LDNPA web-site using the relevant application reference number and post code. If anyone needs to see the actual hard copy plans the Clerk can be contacted.

Councillor volunteers agreed to deal with the over abundant growth on the willow tunnel in the playground and its future maintenance will be discussed at the next meeting on Tuesday November 21st.

If you feel unwell and think it is a medical emergency DIAL 999 or 112 and ask for AMBULANCE. Any on call CFR's will then be tasked by Ambulance control to attend if appropriate. CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest, some trauma. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12.
