Dear Friends

Perspective is a funny thing. An Irish comedian described, on radio, his meeting with the Irish president, whose tiny stature and Leprechaun looks have made him quite an iconic figure. “He frightened the life out of me,” said the comic, “I thought he was far away in the distance, then suddenly realised he was right there beside me!”

Things can seem far away, when in fact they’re very close to you. Christmas itself can have that effect – you think it’s months away, then suddenly it’s here and you’ve left it rather late to do your shopping (or perhaps that’s just me). But more profoundly, God is always closer to us than we realise. He promises that he’s very close to us all the time, but it doesn’t always seem that way. Sometimes he seems far away, sometimes he doesn’t seem to be there at all. It’s not that he is far away (or very small). It’s just that to our perspective, he seems it.

Whether things are far or near depends entirely on *our* perspective. Perspective is a purely subjective concept, describing how *I* relate to things around me. Sometimes God feels far away because we’re suffering. That doesn’t mean he’s *actually* far away, it just means that we’re struggling to notice anything much above the pain – people close to us can sometimes seem just as far away at such times. Sometimes God seems far away because we’ve wandered off into a

different mental place and have stopped noticing him. Sometimes, it's because we're looking in the wrong direction and sometimes it's because we're looking for the wrong thing – we're expecting God to be like *that*, when in fact he's like *this*. These are common human experiences.

Christmas is a celebration of God drawing close to us. It is an annual season of amazement and wonder that God should step down into our world appearing as someone we can relate to, seeing what we see, touching what we touch, tasting what we taste and speaking to us in our own language. To me, reading about Jesus in the Gospels is a constant thrill, seeing how God himself lives this human life of mine, relating to others, coming up against all the same problems and struggles I do, and sharing my love of climbing hills, enjoying fun, bread, wine and company. He's so very human! And yet he's God, suddenly much closer than I ever expected.

Every year I get the old tingle of wonder at those words from the start of John's Gospel: "The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world." It's so objective, so solid, so deeply comforting. He's in the world! He "lives among us"! If we're feeling lost and want to know where God is, he's out in the wilderness tracking us down like a good shepherd. If we're suffering and want to know where God is, he's right beside us on his Cross. If we have money worries and want to know where God is, he's right beside us in a cold manger, relying on a neighbour's kindness. He's right here, quietly transforming everything with his presence – touching each sore, broken, frightened thing in this earth with his love, his forgiveness, his hope and his life-giving power. Every year, Christmas restores my sense of perspective and reminds me how close God is. "I thought he was far away in the distance, then suddenly realised he was right there beside me!" Happy Christmas and may God be with you all.

As we approach the anniversary of Storm Desmond it is time to reflect on an eventful year for the Trust. The storm led to the temporary evacuation of Gillian Robinson and her entire family from Essendy for 6 months – one unexpected benefit from the absence of an occupant at St. Michael's vicarage! Whilst the necessary insurance renovation work was being done the opportunity was taken to add other facilities.

What we could not have envisaged was that on 1st November we would have three empty properties but the good news is, at the time of writing, that there is interest in the residential properties; John and Janet are continuing to run the Post Office and shop until the vacancy is filled; and prospective tenants for the Post Office, Graham Uney and Olivia Abbott, are expected to take over very early in the New Year. Opposite is a small piece by Graham and Olivia introducing themselves.

There are also imminent changes in the trustees. At our meeting next February we shall be losing the services of Pat Garside, Margaret Pearson and Sarah Richardson all of whom have contributed greatly to the establishment of the Trust as a force for good within our community – in Margaret's case since the Trust's inception in 1996. Bampton Parish Council

The Parish Council held their last meeting of 2016 recently and Mike Jones was co-opted to replace John Stones who resigned because he is leaving the village.

The half yearly financial report was presented by the Clerk and discussion led to the decision to keep the precept at the same level as last year. The precept is the amount given to councils by EDC so that they can carry out their duties for the benefit of the community. Parishioners will have noticed the smart new parking area near Grange Bridge created by CCC Highways. The work will be partly financed by the Parish Council with the help of a grant from the Lake District Park Authority.

A new notice board for parish rather than church use is to be installed to the right of the church gate as the existing one is small and difficult to reach. The new one is artificial rather than real wood and it is hoped that this will prove to be more durable and weather proof while still looking acceptable. If it proves to be successful other old boards may be replaced.

The council has commissioned a memorial plaque to be placed by a rowan tree which is to be planted on Bomby Green in memory of Liz Hall. She is sorely missed by the council on which she served for many years as chairman and councillor.

It has been suggested that the Millennium Footpath should be extended towards the river, linking up with the riverside path and the LDNPA has agreed that it would be a good idea. Landowners and farmers have also been consulted and are in agreement so the project will probably go ahead next year.

There have been notices of road closures which will take place in January between Bampton and Shap. Notices of exact dates and locations will be put up in the Post Office. The next meeting will be on **Tuesday January 24th**.

Bampton Community First Responders

The Bampton CFR 2017 Calendar is now ready for sale in the Post Office. Only £10 each! This features landscapes of Bampton and the surrounding area and would make an excellent Christmas present as well as helping raise funds and awareness for the team.

The team had its AGM recently and here is the Chairwoman's report on team activities during the past year:

Team members attended a range of call outs in the last year. It was with great pleasure that the team welcomed Vickie Haddock to the fold earlier in the year. Sadly, 3 team members also left the team: Paul and Judy Johnson due to their move to Sheffield; and Pat Garside also decided it was time to stand down from active service. The team now numbers 6 members, with 3 having been successfully re-assessed and the remaining 3 being assessed on the 25th November. All team members also completed a 2 day emergency first aid course in November 2015. Team training has been every other month due to Christine's University commitments and this seems likely to continue for the next year. Members of Hackthorpe and Askham CFR team have been joining us regularly for training.

The team was involved in the purchase and placement of a public access AED at Bampton Post Office. This was followed by a very successful and well attended Defibrillator awareness morning, kindly hosted by Janet and John at the Post Office. CPR skills were refreshed and some myths and misunderstandings about defibrillators and their use were debunked and cleared up. By the end of the session everyone who had attended said they felt much more confident about how and when to use a defibrillator.

The Big Breakfast earlier in February was very well attended with over 80 people served and approx £400 was raised. Petra Russell and family did the bulk of the preparation and work on the day and I'd like to thank them for their hard work. Thanks also to Pat and John Garside who helped on the day itself and Paul Johnson

who designed the posters. The support from the local community really was amazing, quite humbling and very much appreciated.

The team also received a very generous donation from the family of Leonard Holme for which we are also very grateful.

If you think you'd like to join the team and help provide essential emergency cover for the local community please feel free to get in contact with me for an informal chat or look at the NWAS CFR page <http://www.nwas-responders.info/> All applications are submitted through the web page and are confidential.

If you feel unwell and think it is a medical emergency DIAL 999 or 112 and ask for AMBULANCE. Any on call CFR's will then be tasked by Ambulance control to attend if appropriate. CFR's will not be tasked to attend all 999 calls but will be asked to attend the following type of emergencies: abdominal pain, severe allergic reaction, breathing problems, fitting, diabetic emergency, chest pain, stroke, loss of consciousness, collapse, cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest. We will not normally be tasked to any incident involving children under 12 or traumatic injury such as falls, fractured bones, car accidents etc.
